A Campaign to Help CORA Meet the Need

Last year we launched our capital campaign - A Campaign to Help CORA Meet the Increasing Need. The cornerstone of this campaign is our new 2,800 square foot warehouse and food pantry. While the county has most generously donated both the land and the building, CORA needed to raise \$150,000 to upfit the building to best accommodate the needs of our clients, community partners, and staff. We are happy to announce that we have reached that goal!

The new building will double our current space for the pantry and food storage. This larger space will allow us to streamline operations, more safely and effectively provide the maximum level of support for CORA's multiple programs and allow for a more pleasant shopping experience.



Relocation of the pantry will also enable us to create a spacious reception area, a larger children's room, and a resource room for clients in our current building. In addition, we will renovate the existing building for two community spaces for meetings and additional administrative offices to accommodate organizational growth.

NOURISHING MINDS AT CORA

CORA is more than just a food pantry; it is a place where the community comes together to help those most vulnerable and provide a space of support. One unique way we do this is through our partnership with Book Harvest through their Community Book Bank Program.

The goal of our Community Book Bank is to provide ready access to books for children and families in communities that have historically lacked books for their children. The Book Harvest aspires to transform book deserts throughout our community into book-rich environments. Each month Book Harvest will stock CORA's Children's Area with books that children can take home. Currently there more than 50 Community Book Banks locations throughout the greater Triangle.

"We strive to provide our clients an atmosphere of empathy, support, and community and the children's area is critical to achieving this by giving our youngest visitors a place to access books that they might not have otherwise."

SNACK! (Summer Nutritional Assistance for Chatham Kids) is CORA's summer program that distributes much needed food to Chatham County children who normally receive subsidized meals at school during the academic year. In 2018, over 1,400 children participated in SNACK!, and this summer we have grown to serving almost 1,500 children in need.


Studies show that children who participate in programs like SNACK! receive the nutrition they need and experience many benefits. In the short-term, ensuring proper nutrition for children experiencing hunger can help mitigate summer weight gain, cognitive decline, and summer learning loss. In the longer-term, the lasting effects may help increase high school graduation rates and reduce susceptibility to chronic diseases, which are otherwise each accompanied by large potential costs to the children and their communities.


When families receive food through SNACK! it means that they have more money for housing, healthcare, education, childcare, transportation to work, and other resources that improve quality of life and opportunity.

CORA's impact on the lives of thousands of people across Chatham County is possible because you invest in our mission. We collaborate with many stakeholders from donors of food and funds, volunteers, our network of local farmers and retailers, county officials, and dozens of other community partners so that households at risk of hunger receive the assistance they need. In fiscal year 2019, we secured \$1,690,216 in support.





CORA's Long-term Financial Health

An operating reserve is an unrestricted fund balance set aside to stabilize a nonprofit's finances by providing a cushion against unexpected events and disasters, losses of income, or serious economic downturn. A commonly used reserve goal is three to six months' expenses. CORA's Board of Directors have set aside funds to cover five months' operations and program expenses.

CORA's contributions come from three main sources:



Your gifts help buy bulk food, fuel our truck, and run the pantry, making it possible to build a community without hunger in Chatham County. In fiscal year 2019, we spent 84 cents from each dollar on programs.



Nearly half of the 1 million pounds of food distributed this year was **donated** from farms, grocery stores, and food drives.



Our 300 **volunteers** gave 9,833 hours, which equates to \$250,053 in value to CORA! Our amazing volunteers not only sort, pack, and distributed food, but they provide huge cost savings.
